Services Reach Record Levels

Results in 2022 Exceed All Prior Years

In 2022, the Shepherd's Center achieved record levels of service in all areas. Through the dedication of over 300 volunteers and a dedicated staff, more older adults in our community benefitted from the wide variety of services offered.

We were successfull in responding to a record **15,584** one-way transportation requests during the year.

Participant surveys during the year indicated that 90% of those served would have missed appointments had it not been for the transportation services we provided.



93% said that their need for medical transportation was met and 90% reported that the transportation services we provide had helped them to be healthier while 80% of participants surveyed said that the transportation program has allowed them to remain in their home longer than they would have been able to without our services.

2022 also saw a record number of requests for minor home repairs. A record 857 requests were responded to with 89% of those served reporting that their repair needs were met. 74% of the participants stated the repair program makes them

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The demand for home repairs increased during COVID. While our volunteers were "sidelined" for indoor repairs, we were able to "sub-contract" many of these repairs to reputable contractors in the community.

Since mid-2021, our skilled minor home repair volunteers have returned and are responding to over 90% of all

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Music and Memory How Music Links to the Brain



Listening to music has been linked with activity in the brain to include regions responsible for emotions, creativity and memory.

According to experts, our brains are actively storing information and memories both explicitly and implicitly. Often, it's easier for us to remember information that is associated with beat or rhythm.

A study published in 2015 found that human brains don't just recognize the music, but that evolution has produced a dedicated brain circuit for music. It found that listening to music and singing together has been shown to directly impact areas in the brain, many of which play a role in closeness and connection.

Music can also connect to emotional centers in the brain. Our minds love to categorize information, We may categorize or associate a person to a specific song in time based on the emotional experiences of that time. It's easier to retrieve memories when they are linked to emotional connections like music and a person.

Valuable City and County Funding Continue

The City of Winston-Salem and Forsyth County Government have both awarded the Shepherd's Center continuing operating grants for 2022 - 2023. The grants are being used to provide essential services for older adults in the community.

The services funded include transportation to medical appointments and grocery shopping, minor home repairs, visitation and respite care as well as health and wellness programs and activities through ourVital Living Senior Center Program.

Considering expenditures, including volunteer time, over \$9.50 in value has been returned for every dollar invested by the city and county. Our deep appreciation is expressed to the Winston-Salem City Council and the Forsyth County Commissioners for their continued investment in our important mission.

Retirement Reimagined

Taking a new view of the transition to retirement, *Next Chapter: Retirement Reimagined*, is a four-session workshop being offered by the Shepherd's Center.

The workshop will focus on the nonfinancial side of retirement planning such as: deciding when or if to retire; managing one's time; deciding where to live; the right volunteer or parttime work fits; interests and hobbies; couples in retirement; and other social, emotional, health and spiritual issues.



requests.

The need for minor home repairs has been identified as a significant need for older adults in our community and the Shepherd's Center is one of a very few organizations providing the services througout the county.

A survey conducted by Age-Friendly Forsyth found that transportation and home repairs were among the top priorities of those surveyed.

The Vital Living Program offered a record of over 55 health and wellness activities as well as numerous opportunities for social interaction, life-long learning and support.

Activities include Tai Chi, Yoga, warm water exercise, bridge, chess, discussion groups, drumming and the Shepherd's Center Singers choral group.

A record **3,822** participants took advantage of the activities offered. The attendance in all activities exceeded **42,000**!

Also included in the program offerings is the Medicare counseling and educational offerings through the Seniors' Health Insurance Information Program (SHIIP). Over 1,100 beneficiaries were served during the year with services provided by trained volunteer counselors.

As noted, all of our programs and services are dependent upon the dedicated volunteers who are serving others in the community with the investment of their generous time, compassion and skills.

We express our appreciation to the entire Truist team. We believe our collaboration certainly makes this a more liveable community!

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
New Vital Living Program Assistant

The Age Tipping Point

The number of Americans aged 65 and older has increased to approximately **56** million - **17** % of the population, nearly double the 1960 level of 9%.

The majority, about 55 percent, are women, and among those 85 years and older, nearly two-thirds are women.

In 2030, America will experience a demographic turning point when all baby boomers will be older than 65. That will equal 20% Americans. Also, by 2034, those older than 65 are expected to *outnumber children for the first time in U.S. history*.

Although COVID-19 reduced life expectancy of older Americans by approximately a year, Americans at age 65 years in 2021 could expect to live an additional 18 years on average.

Life expectancy at age 65 vary across America's racial/ethnic groups, with Asians experiencing the highest at 21 years, followed by Hispanics at 19 years and white Americans at 18 years. The lowest life expectancies at age 65 are among the Native American and Black population.

Services Offered for Caregivers

Recent funding from the American Rescue Plan Act supports two new programs. The *Caregiver Activity Pack* program provides carefully chosen objects, projects, and activities that (a) are appropriate for families living with individuals in cognitive decline and (b) can be carried out in the home as caregivers may find the need for new ways of relating or relaxing with care partners. Eligibility and enrollment requirements must be met.

The *Caregiver Book Discussion Group* is designed for those family caregivers with flexibility in their daily caregiving responsibilities. The intent of this project is to provide opportunities for education and socialization around a commonly read book. The ARPA grant allows us to provide books and lunch for Book Group discussions. Eligibility and enrollment requirements must be met for both of these programs.

The Alzheimer's Association offers a *Caregiver Support Group* at The Shepherd's Center on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month from 10:00 to 11:30. Register at *act.alz.org/NCmonthlyprograms* or **800.272.3900**.

It's All About You program is all about caregivers. The daily responsibilities of caring for a loved one can feel overwhelming. While caregivers are often told to take care of themselves, finding ways to actually do that can be challenging. Activities include free outings and activities in each season of the year, with outside events planned in spring and fall and indoor activities in summer and winter. This program is funded by the Family Caregiver Support Program and is coordinated by a team made up of Jeane Wooten and Sue Baker from Trinity Presbyterian Church, Ryan Gragg from ComForCare Home Care, as well as Linda Lewis and Carol Ann Harris from The Shepherd's Center.
